CHILDREN'S CEMETERY VISIT INSPIRES STONE CLEANING PROJECT

This summer Tim Shea and Linda Donadei made a trip from the Cities to explore Owatonna. One of their stops was at the Orphanage Museum. When they walked through the Children's Cemetery, they were overcome with the desire to do something for the resting children. Of the 198 children buried there, most were buried with just their case file number. Shortly after the Museum was organized, all 151 of those graves received a marker with the child's name on it.

The original 47 tombstones are showing their age with lichen hiding children's names and dates. Tim wrote to us offering their services to undertake the task, saying they would follow the protocols used at Arlington National Cemetery.



The City of Owatonna, which owns the property, gave its blessing and the project began on September 10.

Tim and Linda join Marie and Mike Miskovich as volunteer caretakers of the Children's Cemetery. Their only connection to the State School is a desire to honor the children. Thank you for helping keep the children's names visible to the public.

FINDING OSCAR ARTHUR KOSTAMO

"He Wanted To See His Mother little State School Boy Starts on Long Trip for Home He Walked to Waseca Where He Was Apprehended" This newspaper headline from 1910 really captured my curiosity. The little runaway was identified as 12-year-old Oscar Kostamo, who recently joined two sisters and a brother at the State School. He had walked the railroad tracks all the way to Waseca (about 13 miles). A kindly depot agent fed him and listened to his story. He also notified the State School of Oscar's whereabouts.

The article finished this way: "An officer from the state school came up on the evening train to take him back and as the kid with quivering lips stepped abroad the train, he realized his chances of seeing his mother had gone glimmering."

Was Oscar ever reunited with his mother? I wanted to find out, so I began to search in Ancestry. I did discover that the little brother, Edwin, died at the State School in 1911 and was buried in the Children's Cemetery. Oscar was placed out on a farm near Fridley, where he remained until he turned 18 in 1915.

The next record I found for Oscar was in 1917 when he registered for the World War I draft. His father was listed as Next of Kin on the form, but I have not been able to find out what happened to his mother or sisters.

Oscar served in the Army and was honorably discharged in March 1921. I hoped the next document I'd uncover would be a marriage record. Unfortunately, I found his name on Find a Grave. There was no death record filed with the county, but a researcher sent me his obituary. He died in a hunting accident in November 1921, when he was just 23 years old. He was buried in Trout Lake Finnish Cemetery in an unmarked grave. That was not the ending I hoped for. However, there was still one last thing we could try to do for Oscar Kostamo—more than 100 years after his death. We shared Oscar's story with the Itasca County Veterans Service Office and they completed the necessary paperwork to order an official military grave marker. The application was approved and the marker will be in place "by the time the snow flies."

Our thanks go to the Itasca County Historical Society and Itasca County Veterans Service Office for its assistance finding Oscar.
