Cottage 11 Celebrates 100th Year

Constructed in 1923, Cottage 11 was designed by State Architect Clarence Johnston, who also designed Glensheen Mansion in Duluth, Minnesota. It housed 30-35 boys from ages 6-13. This photo

After an extensive restoration project, Cottage 11 opened to visitors in 2009. Come learn the stories of the boys who lived there from trained volunteers. Highlights also include the original terrazzo flooring, bathroom fixtures, and woodwork, and a Gift Shop. C-11 is now open Tuesdays thru Sundays, 1 - 4 p.m.

If Walls Could Talk - Former State School Chapel Yields Treasures

The Groundbreaking Ceremony took place on April 4, for the renovation of the Owatonna City Council Chambers, which was originally built as the "Amusement Hall and Chapel" at the State School. The *amusement* came in the form of plays and musical performances that were given by the State School children. Owatonna citizens were invited up to listen to these performances. Imagine the line up of horses and buggies outside the Administration in the early years.

The stage has been removed, but elements of its design are being incorporated into the new layout. There will also be a display telling the history of the room, from its State School origins to becoming an upgraded community space.



Before the demolition crew moved in, City workers carefully removed artifacts that are being preserved or repurposed. Behind one wall they found three cards that had been tucked away long ago. The cards had copyright dates from 1920 and 1921 and told Bible lessons. Two cards were on the "Evils of Intemperance" and the other on chastity. Non-denomination religious services were held in the chapel on Sunday afternoons. One wonders who put them there and how long ago that was. Now that they've seen daylight again, they'll be included in the historic display.
