"Mother Goose" Mural

A hidden treasure resides in the library of the 1934 school building, now known as Merrill Hall. A whimsical mural surrounds its walls. Miriam Ibling created the "Mother Goose" mural in 1938, as part of a Works Progress Administration (WPA) program creating public art in Minnesota. One of her lithographs is in the collection of the National Gallery of Art in Washington, DC.

Merrill Hall is now home to Wee Pals Child Care Center and Little Theatre of Owatonna. It is next on the City's agenda to get much-needed mechanical upgrades. They are aware of the historical importance of the mural and have plans to protect it, as well as other significant features of the school.


Owatonna State School Presentation at Owatonna Arts Center Saturday, March 30

This program will expand on the history of the Owatonna State School, which existed from 1945-1970. This story is often treated as simply a footnote of West Hills history. Artifact Spotlight: Owatonna City Hospital Bassinet

Does this look familiar? If you were born or hospitalized as a baby at City Hospital before 1961, you may have spent some time in this bassinet. SCHS received the piece earlier this year from the West Concord Historical Society (WCHS) in Dodge County.



The Owatonna City Hospital was initially located in the Oppliger House at 828 South Cedar. The property was purchased for \$6,500 for the development of a hospital. An addition was added to the existing residence and improvements to the interior began after the purchase of the property. On January 5, 1901, the first City Hospital opened. Over the years, it underwent more additions and renovations, mainly in 1906 and 1932.

By 1958, they began a \$1.3 million addition that was completed in 1961. This bassinet was removed from the building because they were being replaced during the renovation process. This bassinet was rescued by a former medical records librarian, who donated it to the WCHS. Due to its significance to the history of Steele County, WCHS reached out and the bassinet was transferred into our collection.



Owatonna City Hospital

Over the next couple of decades, the City Hospital went through more renovations. In 2005, plans were approved for the construction of a new hospital on 26th Street NW. It opened on October 16, 2009. The old hospital was eventually pulverized in January 2013 to make room for Fareway Meat & Groceries.



ORPHANAGE MUSEUM

The Charles S. Crandall Center Uncovering the Past

On November 21, 2023, a formal ribbon-cutting ceremony took place in the renovated City Council Chambers, now known as the Charles S. Crandall Center. It ended a seven-month project upgrading the facility. Nancy Vaillancourt and Anne Peterson from the SCHS were asked to do research and suggest someone from Owatonna history to honor. It didn't take long to come up with the name of Charles S. Crandall and the City Council approved the proposal.


An historic display will soon be added in the Crandall Center to tell how the State School came to Owatonna and its impact on the town.

Their research led to additional discoveries about the room. Here's some of what we found:

• The architect's design for the Main Building referred to the north wing as the "Amusement Hall and Chapel."

The north wing opened in September 1893 and included a stage with a drop curtain, footlights, piano, and stage scenery.

- Plays, cantatas, seasonal programs, and professional musicians filled the room with much entertainment over the years. Holiday programs were especially popular.
- The north wing was destroyed by fire in 1904 and was quickly rebuilt.
- Superintendent Galen Merrill's funeral, as well as the funerals of many of the children, took place in the former Council Chambers.
- The room as a place for church services continued until the Owatonna State School closed in 1970.
- The first Owatonna City Council in the Chambers was on June 1977.



Inscription reads:

More than any other man, Charles S. Crandall was responsible for the creation and location of the Minnesota State Public School in Owatonna. In 1886, it was thought to be one of the most noble and beneficial of the state's charitable enterprises.

Charles Crandall was born in Erie County, Ohio, and came to Deerfield Township, Steele County, in 1857 when he was just 17. Three years later he moved to Owatonna and began his long, remarkable life embracing a variety of activities of public spirit and leadership:

- Farmer
- Postmaster
- Register of Deeds
- Journalist Owatonna Journal
- Hardware Merchant Crandall & Nelson
- Lawmaker State Representative (1874-75) and State Senator (1887-94)
- Director of First National Bank

This facility bears his name to honor his legacy and inspire others to do the best for the Owatonna community in the future.
